

Kōwae Ako - Module Overview

Focused on taoka pūoro (traditional Māori musical instruments) this hands-on activity is designed to help students explore the history and culture of taoka pūoro: as a connector of people to the gods, a spiritual tool, a marker of significant events, an aid to hunting and as entertainment.

Students will be supported to discover the soundscapes that can be created from the natural world, and will make their own simple taoka pūoro.

This module is can be delivered at the iconic Opihi Tainwha rock art sites, at Te Ana Ngāi Tahu Rock Art Centre or at any outdoor venue of your choice.

Contextual Te Reo Māori vocabulary and concepts will be included throughout this module. Pre and post visit teacher materials included; staff professional development options are also available on request.
